Key figures I will learn about:

Romulus and Remus



Romulus and Remus were twin boys who were sons of princess Rhea Silvia. Romulus and Remus were also sons to the mighty Roman God of War (Mars). They were abandoned by their parents as babies and put in a basket. This was placed in the River Tiber. The twins were then found by a

female wolf who nursed them. Eventually, they were brought up by a shepherd. In adulthood, Romulus and Remus wanted to found a city close to where the wolf had found them. This caused the brothers to argue. This arguing led to Remus being killed by his twin brother, Romulus. Now a sole founder of a new city, Romulus gave it his name and called it Rome. The true name of the Wolf who raised the boys is not known; however, there is a bronze sculpture of the Wolf, which is named The Capitoline Wolf.

Boudica (Boadicea)



Boudica lived in Norfolk and was part of the Iceni tribe. She was the female leader of the Iceni tribe in England in 60 AD. The Romans, who invaded England in 43 AD, and the Iceni tribe were on good terms to begin with. Boudica married King Prasutagus and they had two daughters together. Due to Roman law, Boudica had no right to inherit her husband's property because she was a woman. When the Roman's came to take the property, Boudica tried to defy them. Because of this, they beat her and her daughters. Boudica and her family attacked Roman Colchester, destroying the temple and killing everyone. Then, they burned down London and St Albans. Boudica and her rebels were eventually defeated in 61 AD by the Roman commander Gaius Seutonius Paulinus.
