ACCOMPLISH CHALLENGE

As a Trust, we are keen to give back to our community. The staff across the Trust will be taking part in a fund raising walk and we hope you will be able to support this. Accomplish Multi Academy Trust are carrying out the Cleveland Way Challenge on Monday 19th August, walking 19 miles between Saltburn and Whitby.

We are hoping to raise money for MY Hospitals Charity to go towards a brand new radiology suite at Pinderfields Hospital to improve diagnosis and treatment.

The charity is currently running an appeal to raise money for a brand-new radiology suite at Pinderfields Hospital which contains a state-of-the-art 3.0 Tesla MRI scanner. This will not only improve diagnosis and treatment for our local community but will also enable children to be routinely scanned in their local hospital. Currently, most children need to be transferred to Leeds or Sheffield to have an MRI scan. This can be both inconvenient and distressing for the entire family. The new radiology suite and scanner will eliminate the need for that to occur, drastically improving the care of young people in Wakefield, Pontefract and Dewsbury.





Children who are lower than 90% are classed as persistently absent from school and are monitored by school and our education welfare officer every week.

We are sending home letters to children with less than 90% attendance this week, so parents are aware of this monitoring and the need to improve on their education.

We are also sending home letters and organising meetings with parents of children who are persistently late to school, as children are missing out on teacher input at the beginning of the school day and interrupting the start of lessons for children; we would ask that you get children into school on time. Thank you for your support with this.

PENALTY NOTICE FINES FOR SCHOOL ATTENDANCE ARE CHANGING!

With the introduction of the New National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force on 19th August 2024.

PENALTY NOTICES WILL BE ISSUED FOR

Term time leave: Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days

10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period: A Penalty Notice may be considered/issued when a pupil has had 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week* period.

*School Week's

PER PARENT/PER CHILD

Penalty Notice Fines will continue to be issued per parent per child.

For example: 3 Siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

FIRST OFFENCE

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term Time Holiday or Irregular School Attendance the Penalty Notice will be charged at:

£160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 days of issue, reducing to £80 if paid within 21 days**.

SECOND OFFENCE (within 3 years of the First Offence)

Where it is deemed appropriate to issue a second Penalty Notice to the same parent for the same pupil within 3 years of the first notice, the second Penalty Notice will be charged at:

£160 if paid within 28 days (no reduced fee for paying early).

(**Unpaid Penalty Notice's after 28 days may result in a parental prosecution)

THIRD OFFENCE (within 3 years of the First Offence)

On the third time that an offence is committed for either a Term Time Holiday and / or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, the case may proceed straight to Parental Prosecution under the Single Justice Procedure. If found guilty of the offence of 'Failure to send a child to school' the Magistrates can impose a fine up to £1000.
